Recently students from St Joseph's and Sorrento Primary Schools were invited by the Nepean Historical Society to participate in a creative project for the

Sorrento Arts Festival organised by the Sorrento Portsea Chamber of Commerce over the first weekend in October. Years five and six students had the opportunity to work with artist, Jane Byrne, in transforming old mannequins using a range of historic and recycled materials. The results were inspiring and have been much admired.



A 1934 Herald Special Centenary Issue set the themes for the garments. Spring Racing, Australian Forces Servicemen, Travel, Theatre and Music. Students were also inspired by the clothes in the museum's extensive



collection. Bodices, three quarter length sleeves, embellished fabrics and layers of lace were an inspiration for their creations. Music manuscripts, old magazines, playing cards, monopoly money, dress makers' patterns and tissue papers were collaged to create layers of fabric and embellished designs.

The mannequins will continue to be on display in the Sorrento Museum and Stringer's window until the end of November. For the first term of 2013 they will be in the Zart Students' Gallery in Box Hill.

Congratulations to Jane and the participants. The Sorrento Portsea Chamber of Commerce's financial support of the project is acknowledged with thanks.

HERITAGE WATCH

In Brief

Architects have been retained by the Shire to examine the Sorrento Post Office heritage building with a view to its retention and appropriate use.

The proposed heritage path around the Eastern Sister at Collins Settlement Site has been costed at \$1.5m. The budget of \$500,000–600,000 will allow only for a gravel-topped seawall designed to combat erosion, plus boardwalk at two of the most dangerous places.

The Collins Settlement Site

Estate agents' billboards, and even people responsible for decisions at the Collins Settlement Site, still slip into error about this historic site on matters which were settled long ago. The names "Sullivan Bay" and "Collins Settlement Site", the extent and coverage of the Site, and the dating of the graves continue to be misunderstood.

At least since the State Inquiry of 2001, the area of the Sorrento coast where the first deliberate settlement in Victoria by Europeans occurred has been designated as the

Collins Settlement Site. This site, of high heritage significance, is the subject of a Heritage Overlay in the State Planning Scheme, giving it a certain protection against inappropriate development. It is centred on the now signposted Sullivan Bay beach and picnic area lying between the Eastern Sister and the Western Sister, but in fact extends beyond that, from the Cameron's Bight jetty to just short of the Sorrento Sailing Couta Boat Club. The Collins Settlement Site area includes private lots as well as public land, and includes properties such as Tideways (which is the private house adjacent to the Sullivan Bay reserve) and the grand old recently renovated house which crowns the whole site, Nee Morna

The Graves

The grave sites overlooking the sea at the Eastern Sister are thought to be graves of early settlers in the district, but almost certainly not from the period of 1803-1804. There are records of 18-19 deaths during Collins's time at Sullivan Bay, although the burial sites are unknown. However, following investigations in 2001 and since, especially by Des Young, the gravesites from 1803-04 are thought to be far more likely to be located on the other side of the settlement, that is, at the Western Sister. Archaeological investigations are proceeding, under the auspices of the Shire Council and the Nepean Historical Society.

Additional notes:

- 1.Sullivan's Cove (with an "'s") is a coastal site in Hobart, the destination of Collins's re-location in 1804.
- 2. The term "First Settlement" has for more than a decade been regarded as an inappropriate and insensitive name for the site, unless qualified as in "First European Settlement", or "First British Settlement".

ROBERT'S DEADEYE

Our 'Sharing the Past' scanning day for the community in October yielded some photographic treasures and 2 special objects which were donated.

Carolyn Swallow and her husband David brought in a small triple deadeye from the wreck of the Sierra Nevada. This ship was smashed against rocks at London Bridge on the Portsea ocean beach on a wild night in May 1900. The captain was lost and of her 28 crew only 5 reached the shore alive. The Sierra Nevada was carrying a cargo of 1400 tons of 'general merchandise'. The machinery, earthenware, brandy, cotton, whisky was washed ashore and photos of the time show the wreckage feet deep on the beach. (See the NHS booklet The Sea, The Ships, The Settlers for a graphic description and photos.)

All you seafaring people out there will know what a deadeye is, but for landlubbers like me a deadeye was used as part of the rigging on a traditional sailing ship. It is a round wooden piece with 3 holes through which ropes pass. They are sometimes called deadman's eyes, possibly due to the positioning of the 3 holes. This deadeye is beautifully worn and smooth, lovely to touch.

Carolyn explained that her brother, Robert Davenport then in his twenties, was a keen diver, a member of the Marine Archaeological Society. With this group he was diving around the Sierra Nevada in the 1970s and found the deadeye. Following the advice of his fellow divers on how to conserve it, Robert immersed the wooden piece



in a bucket of fresh water over many months, changing the water frequently to draw out the salt and preserve the wood. Carolyn has strong memories of this bucket in the garage at their family home and of the deadeye later in Robert's cabinet at Dromana.

Carolyn also donated a wooden fragment through which a pipe has been passed also from the Sierra Nevada wreck site.

The family were all scuba divers, including Carolyn and her now husband. In the late 1960s they would all meet at the Aquarium at Sorrento for breakfast before their day's diving both inside and outside the Bay.

At the Museum have a look at our new special pieces and check out the large deadeyes we have on display from various wrecks. See also the beautiful companionway from the Sierra Nevada, a spar and the many china pieces that have been donated over the years by divers and beachcombers. But this new little one is special and a nice memento of Robert Davenport who has now passed away.

SORRENTO 1912



1912 could be regarded as the 'Titanic' year of the 20th Century. All other international and Australian events were dwarfed in comparison with this epic maritime disaster resulting in the loss of 1500 lives.

Melbourne saw the price of milk raised to 5d a quart because of dearer feed to the horses. A bill was introduced in the Victorian House of Representatives for £5 a year maternity allowance for white women. Melbourne's new amusement park, Luna Park was opened in St. Kilda and just down the bay at Geelong, the Hills Hoist

rotary clothes line was invented.

Such events probably had little bearing on the daily lives of the townspeople of Sorrento. A glimpse of the pages of newspapers for 1912 reveals the following:-

Collision at Sorrento (January 7)

Last Sunday a collision occurred at Sorrento between the paddle steamers

'Weeroona' and 'Ozone'. The 'Weeroona' had already berthed at the pier when the bow of the 'Ozone' struck the stern of the 'Weeroona'. The 'Ozone' was not damaged but the 'Weeroona' required minor repairs before she could leave Sorrento. It is believed that the collision occurred due to a gust of wind as the 'Ozone' was berthing. Questions are now being raised about the length of the Sorrento pier. It appears to be too small to accommodate passengers disembarking from 2 vessels at a time.



Bather drowned in Treacherous Surf (January 22)

A twenty year old visitor to Sorrento, Alan Hamilton, was swimming with his sister on the back beach below the tramway terminus. Hamilton, from Yea who could swim, was swept out to sea by a large wave. Constable Rawlings was soon on the spot but was unable to recover the youth. His body was recovered five days later. An inquest into the drowning returned a verdict of accidental drowning. However Mr. Buzolich who presided over the inquest stated that warning posts should be erected and life buoys should be placed in an accessible position.

Dispatch Box Missing (January 29)

Sir Walter Bartellot, aide de camp to The Governor General, was travelling on The 'Ozone' from Melbourne to Sorrento. Upon arrival he discovered that he had lost a green Moroccan dispatch box containing important letters and documents belonging to Australia's Governor General Lord Denman. The dispatch box was obviously taken off The 'Ozone' by mistake. Its return to Government House will be welcomed.

Road Closed at Quarantine Station (February 13)

Residents of Sorrento and Portsea areas met last night at the Athenaeum Hall to protest against the action of the quarantine authorities in closing the road to the public. The meeting was presided over by Councillor E. Clark.

'Blood's Thicker Than Beer' (March 6)

William Morce charged with being drunk in charge of a horse and dray appeared before Mr E. Clark at Sorrento Court. Before the trial Const. Brennan objected to Clark sitting on the case as he was a relative of Morce and stated that he should step down. Clark would not. The matter proceeded with Clark dismissing the case and telling Morce he should not get drunk any more.

Death of a Pioneer (March 20)

John Watts, a ranger on the back beach working under the late George Coppin, died at his residence on the 18th of March. The funeral held by the Rev. Mr Rodda was attended by a large gathering. Mr Watts' son, Mr H. Watts, was the president of the local A.N.A. Branch. After the funeral, the disgraceful condition of the road resulted in several vehicles becoming bogged.

Fire at the Continental (April 20)

A fire broke out in the lower bar of the Continental Hotel just after lunch on Friday. A number of residents formed a chain gang and passed buckets of water to the fire. After 1½ hours, the fire was put under control. The storeroom where the fire originated was gutted and considerable water damage occurred. The hotel and furniture were covered by insurance.

Rocket Crew Not Required (October 1)

The 37m brig 'Edward' met with a mishap by running aground off Beacon Rock near Point Nepean. The 'Edward' was on a voyage from Oakwood, Tasmania to Port Pirie, South Australia with a cargo of 200,000 feet of hardwood timber. The Sorrento life-saving corps under the direction of Captain Morgan stood by at Point Nepean from about half past eleven that evening until five in the morning. The services of the rocket crew were not needed as the crew of eight were taken off the ship by lifeboat and landed at Queenscliff at 3.00am. Wave after wave broke over the stern and subsequently the 'Edward' broke up. All her cargo was lost.

Body on the Beach (November 9)

The body of a man was found washed up on the back beach of Sorrento. The body was much decomposed and appeared to have been in the water for a long time. The head and hands were missing. The body was that of a tall stout man in grey tweed trousers, brown socks and Balmoral boots. As there were no papers on his person, the body could not be identified.

The year 1912 could possibly be best summed up as a year of accidents both on the world front and local stage. The Sorrento locals witnessed a drowning, a shipwreck, a hotel fire, misplaced Vice Regal property and a conflict of judicial interests. I just can't wait to see what 2013 brings.
