### A Mystery Jacket with a Famous Connection

Some questions regarding the jacket held in The Museum are being answered. According to the Curator at Fort Queenscliff, Sgt Helen Janner, the uniform with the patrol style collar shows it is not from an Officer but

Non-commissioned officer or Other Rank's. The sleeve insignia denotes the rank of a Warrant Officer class 2, of Heavy Artillery (Coastal Artillery). And due the brass buttons insignia, 'Royal Australian Artillery' it is of pre world war 1 circa. She thinks perhaps around 1908. It is either The Garrison Artillery 1, (NSW) or The Garrison Artillery 2 (Victoria, Fort Queenscliff). Given



current home the latter seems more likely. Given the battery at Pt Nepean was part of the Garrison Artillery 2 the owner may well have been posted there.

The uniform is similar to that worn by John Monash who

was a member of the Metropolitan Brigade of the Garrison Artillery who often trained at Queenscliff, pictured here in 1888. The artillery was later reconstructed and from July 1903, Captain Monash's battery became No.3 Victorian Company, Australian Garrison Artillery.

### FROM THE SECRETARY'S DESK



#### Grant

In December 2011 the Society received a grant from the Mornington Peninsula Shire Council towards the purchase of a TV/DVD unit that will be used for presenting the postcard series and other stories about the history of Sorrento. The funds were provided under the Shire's Community Grants Program.

#### Quarantine

A number of meetings have been held with Parks Victoria in recent years about the future of a Quarantine Museum at Point Nepean. At the January meeting the

Committee of Management of the Society reluctantly resolved that the Friends of Quarantine Museum group will be disbanded from 1<sup>st</sup> March 2012. Current members will be encouraged to join the Parks Friends of Point Nepean Group.



#### OH&S

There have been reports in

recent weeks in the media about proposed changes to the OHS laws that caused concern to some volunteer community groups. We have received advice that these laws which involve greater health and safety protection for volunteers have not yet been introduced in Victoria and the existing OHS laws will remain in place for some months. The Committee of Management is responsible to ensure volunteers have a safe workplace when working at the museum.

#### Tax

The Commonwealth is also planning to introduce an Australian Charities and Not-for-profit Commission that will register and regulate charities by 1st July 2013. Currently charities are registered under existing laws by the Australian Tax Office. The Society has been granted status of a charity by the Tax Office We will continue to monitor these changes as

they are introduced.

### HERITAGE WATCH

#### **Collins Settlement**

Representations have been made to the Shire concerning planning for the proposed new seawall, paths and improved visitor viewing at the Eastern Sister, now that

subdivision of the former Rand Estate has occurred and settlement made with the Shire under the public space contribution rules.

The Shire has been asked by a joint community group in which NHS participates to give a suitable name to the public reserve next to but not part of the private property called Tideways. The reserve has never been named, but is part of a precinct containing Sullivan Bay and Sullivan Bay beach.



#### **Pioneer Memorial Gardens**

The Shire has taken action to require the builder of the new house under construction next to the Sorrento Museum and the Pioneer Memorial Gardens to comply with the access arrangements specified in his permit. Access to the site is to be from the front

or the rear, and not through the Gardens and the side fence as recently occurred.



#### **Point Nepean**

The draft Conservation Management Plan for the Shire Park at Police Point has been received and was due to be discussed during February at a

Reference Group meeting attended by NHS representatives. A feature of the discussions so far has been acknowledgement that Police Point is primarily a heritage site, and an integral part of the old Quarantine Station.

### **Nepean Ward**

The Heritage and Planning working group has noted the decision of the Victorian Electoral Commission to move to a system of multi-councillor wards in the Mornington Peninsula Shire. From the time of the next local elections in October, Nepean Ward will double in size, with approx. 24,000 ratepayers/residents. Rye is being added to the existing areas of Portsea, Sorrento and Blairgowrie. NHS has developed very good and useful working relations with the local Ward Councillor in recent years, and it is to be hoped that similar arrangements can be continued under the new system.

## FROM THE COLLECTION

#### **HETTY'S PURSE**

This touching little leather, coin purse worn so thin from use, with a corner mended with black cotton was recently re-discovered in a drawer in our Watts Cottage, *Ilfracombe*.

Volunteer Bergliot Dallas found it when she was spring cleaning. When she brought it in to show us we all gently stroked the soft leather – it is that sort of object.

We know from its catalogue number that this purse was owned by the third youngest daughter and sixth child born to John Francis and Jane Watts in November 1878. Christened Harriet Maria she was always called Hetty (sometimes she spelt it Hettie.)

Hetty never married and we believe her sweetheart died in WWI. Bergliot had earlier written an interpretation of Hetty's life based around her precious notebook safely stored in our fire proof filing cabinet. You can read Bergliot's moving piece in the Museum – it is one of our Treasures of the Museum booklets written by volunteers in 2010.

After her mother's death in 1935 Hetty lived on at *Ilfracombe* until 1958. She died in 1962 aged 84 and is buried in

Sorrento Cemetery. Her little purse is on display now.

### Wrecks, Rockets and Rescue

### TOURS

Early in December we hosted a group of senior officers from the Defence International Training Centre who were ably escorted as usual by Des Young and Richard Cotter around historic sites in Sorrento and at Point Nepean before visiting the Museum and Watts' Cottage. Grade 6 from Sorrento Primary School also came to discover the treasures of local history before moving on to high school.

But the most exciting event In December was when the Nepean Historical Society was asked by an arts based organisation, Aphids, who were working in partnership with Parks Victoria for assistance in providing background information on Point Nepean and the Quarantine Station. The project is ongoing and when complete in September 2012, the use of innovative technology such as iphone apps, cinematic chapters and original sound scores will all assist to interpret the area in a very new and exciting way.

Natasha Wicks embraced the challenge of organising a program at short notice and did a great job. She was ably assisted by the team she established and to whom she has expressed her thanks for their time and enthusiasm when they spoke to Aphids at the Quarantine Station on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> December. She writes as follows:

Richard Cotter gave a witty account of the bay, with and without the sea, and of the Boon Wurrung people. Jim Barras, from the upper veranda of the hospital, gave us great background information on the reasons why people made that journey on the Ticonderoga. This was followed by an in-depth account from Alison Jones whose descendants were on board the Ticonderoga (See opposite-Ed). A highlight was seeing the brooch worn by her relative.

John Alexander spoke on limestone, how it was formed and the kilns used to manufacture it. Elsie Barras took us to the cemetery and focused on the monument commemorating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Ticonderoga tragedy and the stories associated with those whose names appear on it. Robyn Johnston, the daughter of Bob Johnston spoke of her memories of living at Police Point while her father was in charge of the station. Thanks also to Con Mullen who was unavailable on the day.

On the following day, as requested by the Aphids artists, some of the croquet club members turned into film stars! They spent a few hours dressed in their croquet uniforms, wearing cardboard glasses while

### The 'Calcutta' and William Bligh

HMS Calcutta, which brought out David Collins to Sorrento in 1803, was built by Perry and Co at Blackwell and named the 'Warley'. She was launched on 16 October 1788 as an East Indiaman trading vessel of 1176 tons, which was quite a large ship at the time (the 'Endeavour' was 368 tons, the 'Sirius' 540 tons while the 'Victory' weighs 2164 tons.) In early 1795, the Royal Navy purchased the 'Warley' and had her refitted as a 56 gun 4th rate and re-named the 'Calcutta'. Her role was to escort convovs.

Captain William Bligh returned from his second (and successful) breadfruit expedition in the 'Providence' in August 1793 and then spent the next 18 months clearing his name from the 'Bounty' mutiny of 1789. In April 1795 he was appointed commander of the 'Calcutta' to oversee its conversion from merchant ship to battleship before joining the North Sea fleet the following August. Bligh commanded the 'Calcutta' until early 1796 when he was posted as captain of the 64 gun larger HMS Director of 1400 tons with a crew of almost 500 men to rejoin the fleet patrolling the Channel and the

North Sea.

Following Bligh's departure, 'Calcutta' was transferred to the Transport Board and had her lower deck guns removed to increase her cargo carrying capacity. She served in this transport role until 1802 when she was fitted out as a transport for convicts being sent to Britain's penal colonies in Australia. Captain Daniel Woodriff was appointed to her in November 1802 and sailed Spithead on 28 April 1803, accompanied by the 'Ocean' to settlement at Port establish a



Phillip which he reached on 12 October. The 'Calcutta' left the settlement for Sydney the following December and arrived back at Spithead on 23 July 1804.

Two months later the 'Calcutta' was again fitted out for duty as a cruiser, still under the command of Captain Woodriff. In September 1805, she was escorting a convoy to England in the English Channel when engaged by a French squadron. The 'Calcutta' was captured and Woodriff was imprisoned at Verdun until 1807 when he was released back to England. On 12 March 1809, the 'Calcutta was part of a French squadron when, during the Battle of the Basque Roads, she ran aground on the shoals of Les Palles. The French crew abandoned ship and an English boarding party set fire to her to prevent her recapture by the French, causing her to explode.

The NHS has an excellent large scale model of the 'Calcutta' at the Museum which is well worthwhile inspecting. We also have post cards featuring pictures of the 'Calcutta'.
