Truganini and Troedel

<u>Question</u>: What could Truganini, (c.1812-1876), a Nuenonne woman long believed to be the last indigenous Tasmanian, and Charles Troedel (1835-1906), prominent German-born lithographic printer, have in common?

Answer: Both have links to our area!

Historian and author Cassandra Pybus, descendant of Bruny Island landowners, had heard in childhood of an old indigenous woman wandering her country in the 1850/60s ,and learned later that this was Truganini. Her new book *Truganini: Journey through the* Apocalypse¹, short-listed for the Queensland (Non-fiction) Literary Prize, tells in great detail the story of an intelligent, lively, manyfaceted woman, who after suffering both personal and community tragedy early in life, became interpreter, guide, and even friend, to George Augustus Robinson, whose diaries proved a major resource for the author. This unusual man, a builder and self-styled missionary, appointed by Governor Arthur as agent of 'conciliation and civilisation' in Tasmania, then became Chief Protector of Aborigines for Port Phillip. On moving to this post in Melbourne in 1839, he took with him Truganini and her partner Wooredy.

In Spring, he took the couple to the Mornington Peninsula camping "for several nights ...near Point Nepean, [where] a natural depression had created an ephemeral wetland with a limpid lagoon .. sanctuary for large flocks of grey herons, black swans and blue-billed ducks .. Surrounding grassland provided food for mobs of large kangaroos. At one spot they found a Kulin burial site where two bodies had been burnt, and in other places the trampled grass indicated the tracks of

settlers' cattle, yet they found no other sign of human activity."² They were reminded of their country on Bruny Island.

When Robinson went on tours without them, many of the Tasmanians and others living near his house would go off on their own trips, to be found and brought back by his sons. Truganini had obviously taken a liking to our area, as in June 1840 "she was located living with two shepherds in a hut on a pastoral lease at Point Nepean ...[and], "this pattern of behaviour would be repeated several times." ³

Now for the second link to our area. Amanda Scardamaglia's book 'Printed on Stone: the Lithographs of Charles Troedel ⁴, has just won the Victorian Premier's Literary prize in the 2020 Victorian Community History Awards. Inspired by a huge archive at the State Library, this is described as "a stunning book ... in part a history of advertising in lithograph... commercial, social and cultural". [See photo front cover]

I first heard of the Troedel family when I found in our archives an interesting document, the Indenture (or Apprenticeship) Agreement between the printing firm and David Macfarlan, aged about 14. After some years with the printers, and running a hotel at 20, Macfarlan came to Sorrento in the early 1900s, married Mary Thorpe, bought his brother-in-law's grocery store, and with Walter Stringer doubled its size. He then ran the town cinema 1923-48, helped compile the 1917 local guide, was JP 1911-50, Flinders Shire Councillor 1914-43, (President four times), had a recreation reserve named for him, helped found the local ANA, and was Life Governor of the Alfred Hospital and

the Royal Institute for the Blind. A remarkable man, still remembered by retired Troedel staff when I contacted the firm years ago to offer them a copy of the Indenture Agreement. I like to think that the qualities imbued in him by his first employer stood him in good stead. Our district certainly gained from his stalwart efforts and community spirit over a long period of time.

The Last Donation of a Sorrento object before the 2020 lockdown



In March Fred Dijkgraaf rang about a street lamp cover he wanted to donate to the museum, and arrived with a rather large 108 x 103 cm white, heavily textured glass lamp cover, in perfect condition. The story is that Fred's father-in-law found this in Port Phillip Bay in the 1960s or 1970s. Fred believes it was one of a few used along Ocean Beach Road Sorrento in the 1950s /60s.. He understands many were broken and thus replaced with the less beautiful but more stone resistant metal ones.

This may be the only one remaining in one piece.

Does any one remember these lamps?



Vale Elsie Barras

Elsie and her husband Jim joined the Nepean Historical Society in 1996. As she had worked for years as an archivist at Victoria College in Burwood, later Deakin University, we asked if she would help us by cataloguing the many artefacts left at the Quarantine Station, a massive task in which she enlisted Jim's help too.

Their workplace, the boiler house, where most objects were stored, was in poor repair, freezing in winter, and rat-infested! Nevertheless, Elsie and Jim patiently worked for several years classifying and preserving anything of possible historical significance, and became involved with the new Friends of the Quarantine Museum, a sub-group of NHS, who helped them, and reinstated guided tours of the Station with John Alexander, Alison Jones, Con Mullen and others.

2002 saw the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the arrival of the worst fever ship, Ticonderoga, and the subsequent establishment of the Quarantine Station. This big event, which would probably not have taken place or been such a success without Elsie's tireless efforts, especially in contacting descendants of the ship's passengers, culminated in the installation of a green granite stone engraved with the names of those who died after arrival. She was also involved with maintenance of the Point Nepean cemetery. Elsie then continued to work with the Friends under a Melbourne Uni special team on the artefacts, which were put into safe storage as building works began under the Master Plan, until Parks Victoria took over management of the whole site in 2009.

Elsie then turned her energy and passion to the Point Nepean based Croquet Club, acting as treasurer and teaching members new to the game, and giving them and visitors tours of the Station as well. As her health deteriorated, she became less mobile but helped organise the book section at Jack and Andy's Op. Shop.

She inspired others with her love of Point Nepean history and, always outspoken and at times a tad gruff, she had a heart of gold. She died aged 86 in Mornington at the end of February this year. Our sympathy goes to Jim and the family, with apologies for the delay, due to the pandemic.
